## Our History. . .

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul was founded in 1833 by Frederic Ozanam, a 20-year old student of the Sorbonne University in Paris, France. Challenged to "practice what they preached", Frederic and a group of fellow students sought out the poor in Paris in their homes and brought them bread, clothes and, most importantly, friendship. This small group took as their Patron the great French priest, St. Vincent de Paul.

Similar groups began to form in Paris, and then spread throughout France, and eventually throughout the world. In 1845, the first U.S. Conference was formed in St. Louis, Missouri. Seven years later (1852) the first Conference was started in the heart of Pittsburgh. Today there are 108 Conferences within the Diocese of Pittsburgh with more than 1,000 members.

## Our Members. . .

We are young and old. Our members come in every shade of skin color. Some of us are wealthy, some are financially poor, but all of us are blessed with an awareness that our blessings (time, talent or treasure) are to be shared with our brothers and sisters in need.

We are part of an international society of friends united by a spirit of poverty, humility, and sharing, which is nourished by prayer and reflection, mutually supportive gatherings, and adherence to a basic Rule. Energized by the awareness that service to our brother or sister in need is in fact an encounter with our Lord Jesus Christ, members of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul are keenly aware that poverty, suffering and loneliness are present for millions in our communities. For that reason, we collaborate with all who seek to relieve need and address its causes.

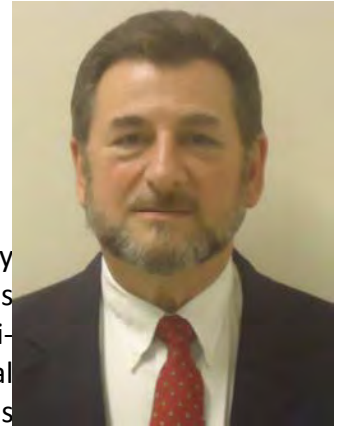
The Society of St. Vincent de Paul offers tangible assistance to those in need on a person-to-person basis. It is this personalized involvement that makes the work of the Society unique. This aid may take the form of intervention, consultation, or often through direct dollar or in-kind service. An essential precept of the Society's work is to provide help while conscientiously maintaining the confidentiality and dignity of those who are served. The Society recognizes that it must assume, also, a role of advocacy for those who are defenseless or voiceless. Some 12 million persons are helped annually by Vincentians in the United States.

The list of services of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in the United States is endless. No work of charity is foreign to the Society. To quote our patron, St. Vincent de Paul: "*Charity is infinitely inventive.*"

## Vincenzians Offer Hope to a Troubled World. . .

One only has to read the paper or watch television to realize that people throughout the world are struggling to find hope in their lives. Many people have succumbed to despair and are living lives of quiet desperation. Throughout the history of the Catholic Church, God has raised up people during some of its darkest hours to bring hope, comfort and encouragement.

In the difficult times in which we live, Vincenzians have the unique opportunity to bring hope to the people they serve. Hope is different than optimism. One can be an atheist and have optimism. Such a person believes that humans have the capacity to make things better by sheer effort.

Vincenzians realize that the problems our world faces can only be addressed through the power of God. Their hope is rooted in the belief that God will never give up on His people. Vincenzians are not social workers, they are instruments of God's mercy and justice. They believe Jesus meant it when He told His Disciples that they would be able to do the works He did and even greater works. Fortified with prayer, Vincenzians reach out to the people whom they serve with the resources they have. Their willingness to listen, comfort and pray with people brings light and hope to the poor, sick, elderly and lonely.

Vincenzians realize that they do not have all the answers. They are not naive and do not offer simplistic solutions to complicated problems. What they do offer people is the opportunity to hope again by addressing immediate problems and then helping the people to mobilize their energy to network with other people and other organizations to find long term solutions.

Sometimes people become overwhelmed and find it difficult to take that first step which will bring health, financial stability and a brighter future. Vincenzians play a key role in helping people believe that they can take that first step because they will not do it alone.

When the woman who had been sick for 12 years came to Jesus, she still had hope that she could be cured. Her hope gave her the strength to leave her home, squeeze through the crowd, face the hostility of the people and then be rejected by Jesus. Her hope and faith brought her healing.

Vincenzians cannot offer hope to people if they do not have it in their own lives. An important scripture passage to reflect on is Romans 12:12. St. Paul exhorts his readers to: *"Rejoice in hope. Be patient under trial and be constant in prayer."* A strong prayer life helps a Vincenzian not to be overwhelmed by the problems that people bring them. Trusting in the power of God working in their lives, Vincenzians offer hope to people who walk in darkness. A Chinese Proverb says: *"It is better to light one little candle than curse the darkness."* By the grace of God, Vincenzians often are the "candles" people need.

### During 2012, the SVdP Diocesan Council of Pittsburgh. . .

- Supplied clothing vouchers to **3,082** individuals in need.
- Provided a dignified Christian burial to **30** indigent persons.
- Assisted **171** clients with electric and gas utility bills totaling over **\$25,000**.
- Aided **9,673** walk-in and referral clients with basic needs assistance in the form of clothing, furniture, rent, and utilities.
- Provided **\$30,000** in twinning assistance to the SVdP Conference of Southern West Virginia to help individuals and families in need with clothing, furniture, rent, and utility payments.

## 2nd Annual Friends of the Poor Walk a Success. . .

26 SVdP Conferences participated in the 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Friends of the Poor Walk in the Fall of 2012. A total of \$47,444 was raised from individual and corporate sponsorships. Thanks to the generosity of **UPMC Health Plan & UPMC Mercy; PNC Financial Services Group; Herbein+Company, Inc., and Duquesne University**, total sponsorships increased \$16,897 over last year! In addition to money raised by individual sponsors, all participating conferences split the balance of corporate sponsorships, and received an extra \$753 to provide services to local people in need.

## During 2012 our Food Pantry. . .

- Distributed **147,073** pounds of consumable goods.
- Served **3,927** eligible North Side residents whose income level was 150% of the federal poverty level.
- Delivered food supplies twice per month to **65** senior citizens living at Steelworkers Tower Senior High Rise on the North Side.
- Provided **465** individuals with a variety of new wrapped Christmas gifts and toys during the holiday season.

## “Speedy Delivery” to the Poor. . .

In the Spring of 2012, The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul teamed up with the non-profit group Friends of Hollywood Theater to sponsor a special sweater drive for people in need. The sweater collection was held in conjunction with a special showing of the local film, “*Speedy Delivery*”, at the Hollywood Theater.

The film stars Pittsburgh’s own David Newell, more commonly known as Mr. McFeely of Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood. Moviegoers donated over 100 sweaters which were distributed through

## Michael's Place: A Home of Hope & Recovery

Michael's Place is The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul's voluntary residential program for homeless men, released from jail, who want to change their lives. It is a temporary home for ex-offenders who are ready to commit themselves to making good decisions for a productive future.

In a safe, drug-free environment, residents receive support in developing basic life skills that will enable them to transition to positive, independent living and employment.

Michael's Place fosters compassionate healing through a comprehensive approach that addresses the spiritual, physical, psychological and social well-being of the residents.

Michael's Place, like all Society programs, is nonsectarian and accepts men who are over twenty years of age regardless of race, color, or creed.

### During 2012, Michael's Place served. . .

- **28** men, including **1** veteran.
- The average age of the men was **33** years. Ages ranged from **20** to **57** years.
- **17** men arrived during the year, **3** entered directly from jail, **10** entered from local addiction treatment centers, **3** from emergency shelters and **1** directly from the streets.
- **8** men participated in vocational training or schooling.
- **5** men left before completing addiction treatment.
- Of the **13** men who stayed at least long enough to complete treatment, none had income at entry. At exit, **2** men had no income, **4** had general assistance and **7 (54%)** were employed.
- **17** of the **18** men who left moved into permanent housing.
- **1** man reunited with his wife and children. Another moved into a permanent housing program with his **2** year old daughter.
- Michael's Place currently has **2** alumni on staff. Other alumni remain actively involved.



## Today I Am Happy. . .

My name is David and I have been at Michael's Place for one year now. When I came to Michael's, I did not know how to stay clean and sober. My drug and alcohol use combined with my attitudes and behaviors left me homeless. Financially, emotionally and spiritually broke. I couldn't figure out what to do. I was homeless and did not know how to ask for help.

I am so grateful for Michael's Place. I never knew there was a place like this. Thanks to the generosity of individuals and the staff here, my life has changed so drastically I am amazed. They cared for me when I could not care for myself. The house taught me that I'm not perfect and how to ask for help. The staff and my God have never given up on me. As a result, today I have a relationship with my family where at one time there was none. I have real friendships, I'm accountable, I have a full-time job. I have a sense of personal responsibility to myself and my community and most importantly, peace of mind.

Anything is possible if I continue to stay clean and sober and ask for help. Today I am happy. Thank you Michael's Place, truly thank you.

## A Word From Linda Kilderry, Director of Michael's Place. . .

Like so many of our men, David arrived at Michael's Place carrying a small garbage bag that held everything he owned. At first he was very quiet, watching much more

than speaking. It didn't take long for David to adjust to the schedule at Michael's Place. His day would begin with morning meditation at 7:30 AM and then he would take a bus to outpatient addiction therapy. He would arrive back home around 3:30, do his chores and take his turn cooking dinner. Most evenings he attended 12 step recovery meetings with the house followed by evening meditation, a little time to relax and then bed.

David was always polite and very helpful around the house. As we gradually got to know David, we learned he came from a large family. He has six siblings, all successful in their professions. He had burned his bridges with most of his family and regarded himself as a failure. If his brothers and sisters developed happy, productive lives, why didn't he? Why was he the only one to fall prey to drugs and alcohol?

David had been to addiction treatment before but this time he wanted to get well, not just stay out of trouble. At treatment and at Michael's Place he was taught that his history did not mean he was a bad person, but that he had the disease of addiction. He was also taught that recovery is possible. The 12 step recovery program offers a spiritual tool kit, but it is his responsibility to use those tools on his own recovery. We watched David build relationships with other men in the house, accepting and being accepted. It was quickly apparent that he chose to be friends with those who were serious about rebuilding their lives. After he completed treatment, he found employment and began to rebuild relationship with his family.

It was wonderful to watch David begin to feel good about himself as he chose to do the next right thing. Soon David will complete the program at Michael's Place. He hopes to share an apartment with another graduate of our program.

The other day I heard him say that although all the men at Michael's Place have different stories, they all share the bond of recovering from addiction and that bond makes all the difference in the world. Not only had God never given up on him, He had brought David to Michael's Place and given him a chance to find the happiness and peace of mind that he had never found in the past.

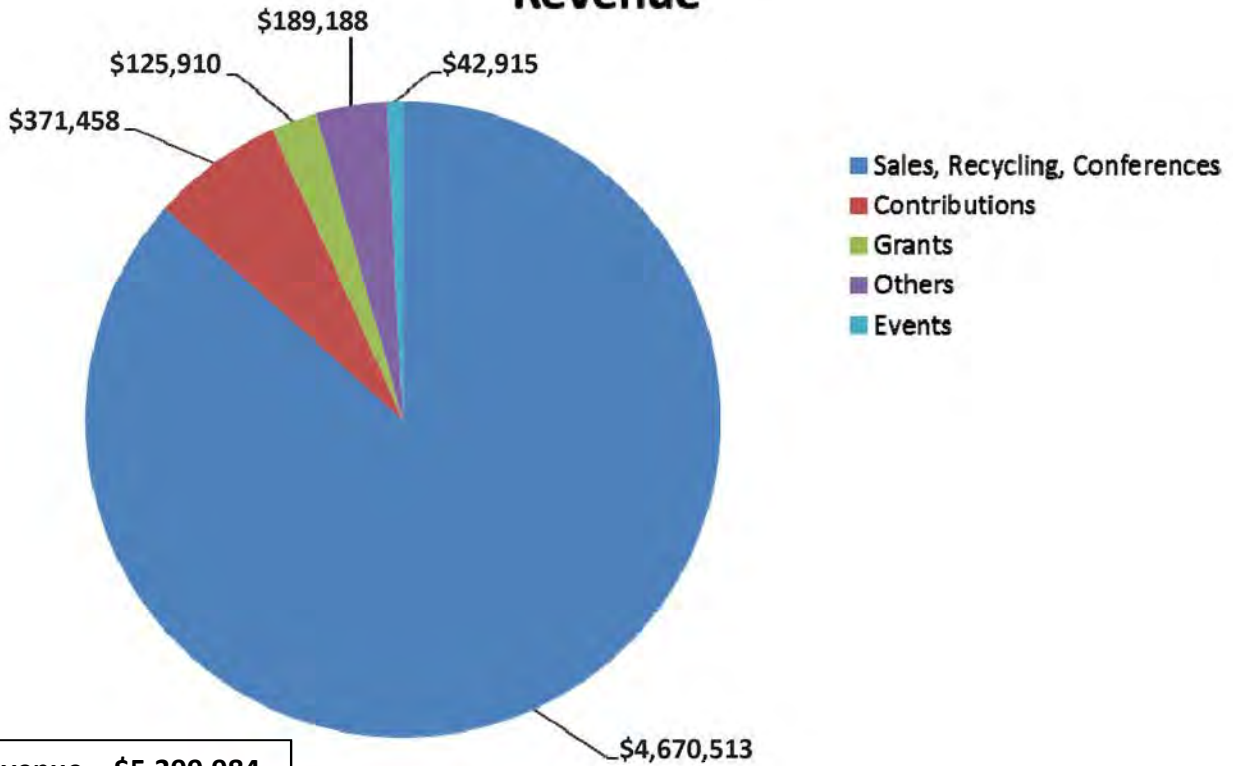

# Revenue & Expense Summary\*

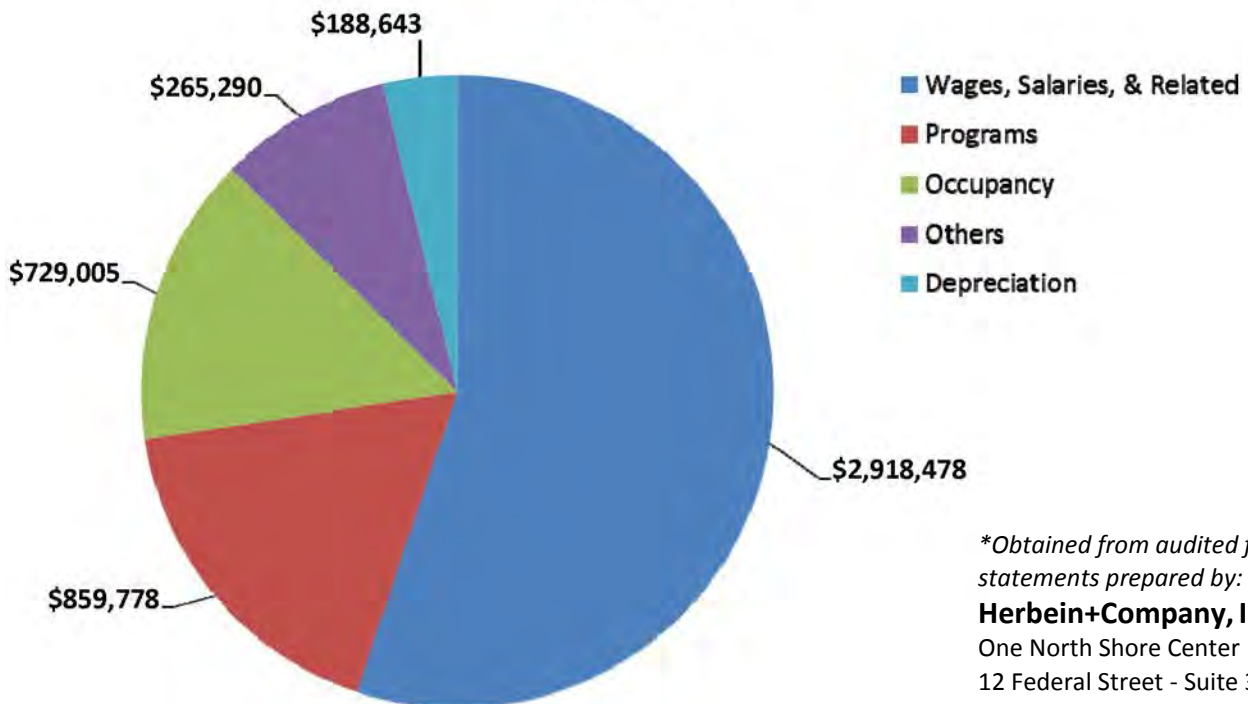
October 1, 2011 - September 30, 2012
