Our History. . .

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul was founded in 1833 by Frederic Ozanam, a 20-year old student of the Sorbonne University in Paris, France. Challenged to "practice what they preached", Frederic and a group of fellow students sought out the poor in Paris in their homes and brought them bread, clothes and, most importantly, friendship. This small group took as their Patron the great French priest, St. Vincent de Paul.

Similar groups began to form in Paris, and then spread throughout France, and eventually throughout the world. In 1845, the first U.S. Conference was formed in St. Louis, Missouri. Seven years later (1852) the first Conference was started in the heart of Pittsburgh. Today there are 107 Conferences within the Diocese of Pittsburgh with more than 1,000 members.

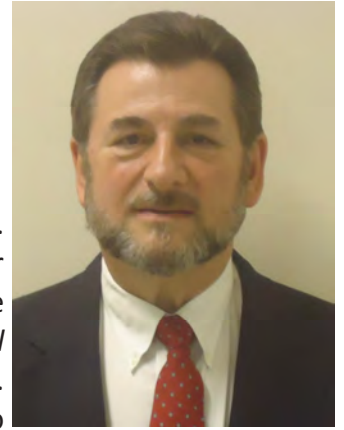
Our Members. . .

This aid may take the form of intervention, consultation, or often through direct dollar or in-kind service. An essential precept of the Society's work is to provide help while conscientiously maintaining the confidentiality and dignity of those who are served. The Society recognizes that it must assume, also, a role of advocacy for those who are defenseless or voiceless. Some 12 million persons are helped annually by Vincentians in the United States. The list of services of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul in the United States is endless. No work of charity is foreign to the Society. To quote our patron, St. Vincent de Paul: "*Charity is infinitely inventive.*"

“Feed my sheep. . .”

There is a very moving scene at the end of Saint John’s Gospel that can help a person understand Vincentian Spirituality. After the Resurrection, Jesus appears to His disciples and quickly directs three questions to Peter. Three times He asks Peter: “Do you love me?” With growing anguish, Peter answers each time: “Yes, Lord, you know I love You.”

This exchange is important for two reasons. The first is that Peter, having denied three times that he knew Jesus, is given a chance to proclaim his love for Jesus three times. The second reason this exchange is important is because of what Jesus says when Peter expresses his Love. He says: “Feed My lambs.” “Feed My sheep.” “Look after My sheep.”

Vincentians can appreciate what transpired between Jesus and Peter because we know that growth in holiness involves three things: recognizing our faults and failings, seeking the mercy of God, and expressing gratitude for God’s unconditional love by ministering to Jesus when we meet Him in the poor, the sick, the homeless and the marginalized.

One of the biggest challenges of the aging process is not to become discouraged with the slow pace of spiritual maturity. It is easy to give into discouragement. After Peter denied Jesus three times and heard the rooster crow, he went off and wept bitterly. However, unlike Judas Iscariot, he did not separate himself permanently from the other disciples. When Jesus revealed Himself to the disciples while they were fishing, Peter jumps out of the boat and rushes to Jesus.

Every day we have a chance to rush to Jesus. Through prayer and the Eucharist we can receive His love as well as the strength to continue our spiritual journey. A key component of spiritual growth for a

Vincentian is reaching out to those in need. When we are tempted to be impatient with those we serve, our time at prayer will remind us of how often Jesus is patient with us. Consider the scene in Matthew’s Gospel when Peter asked Jesus how often must he forgive a brother who wrongs him? He thought Jesus would be amazed when he suggested that seven times would be a good number. One can only imagine Peter’s shock when Jesus told him: “No, not seven times, I tell you seventy times seven times.”

We need to realize that Peter doesn’t automatically become a saint when he professes his love for Jesus three times. The Acts of the Apostles reveals how he continued to grow in understanding God’s Will and following it. Saint Vincent de Paul and Saint Louise de Marillac did not become saints in the blink of an eye. Their growth in holiness was a slow process of being open to God working in their lives. This is true of every person who wants to become a better Vincentian. It is a slow process, but one that ultimately allows Vincentians to recognize the presence of God where they live, where they worship and where they serve God’s people.

- Supplied **2,664** clothing vouchers to individuals in need.

2013 Friends of the Poor Walk a Huge Success. . .

39 SVdP Conferences participated in the 3rd Annual Friends of the Poor Walk in the Fall of 2013. Thanks to individual sponsors and the generosity of **UPMC Health Plan; PNC Financial Services Group; & Herbein+Company, Inc.**, a total of \$52,080 was raised to support direct services and assistance to local individuals and families in need.

During 2013, SVdP's Path to New Life Program served. . .

- 3 men.
- The average age of the men was 54 years. Ages ranged from 51 years to 60 years.
- 1 man was a graduate of Michael's Place.
- 1 man was referred from an emergency shelter.
- 1 man came directly from the street.
- 1 man participated in schooling.
- 2 men underwent surgery to improve their quality of life.

Path to New Life: *The Next Step Toward Hope and Recovery*

In the twelve years that Michael's Place has been serving homeless ex-offenders, it became apparent that some men face more complex barriers and need additional time and support to make the transition from incarceration and homelessness to an independent and productive life. While all are recovering from addiction, these individuals have additional problems that range from physical issues to mental health concerns.

Path to New Life, The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul's new program, offers these men hope! If a man is willing to make a commitment to take the difficult steps necessary to continue his journey towards independence, the **Path to New Life** program will give him the opportunity. The primary purpose of this program is to provide an environment where each individual can accomplish clearly defined and time limited goals that will assist him in achieving an independent and productive life. Each man is housed in a fully furnished, one bedroom apartment. Food is

provided through Pennsylvania's Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program and a local food pantry. Clothing is provided by donations and the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul's Thrift Stores.

Each man works closely with a Service Coordinator, who visits him in his apartment, to develop an individualized Service Plan designed to address specific needs and overcome challenges and barriers. The initial goal is stabilization. In addition, any existing medical concerns are addressed.

Depending on the need, residents participate in addiction treatment, mental health treatment, or dual diagnosed treatment. They are also required to attend Alcoholics Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous meetings during the week.

Once stabilized, men may choose to explore opportunities offered by The Office of Vocational Rehabilitation or attend any of the many vocational training or educational programs available in the Pittsburgh area. If they have marketable skills, they may choose to directly obtain employment. Similar to the residents in

Michael's Place, once they have a steady income, the men work with their Service Coordinator to establish a budget that includes a service fee and savings. They are also included in several events with residents from Michael's Place including retreats at St. Paul's Retreat Center, a Narcotics Anonymous Retreat in the spring and an Alcoholics Anonymous Conference in the fall.

All the apartments are close to Michael's Place, enabling the men to drop in for dinner or to hop on the van and attend recovery meetings with the residents. When they no longer need the support of **Path to New Life**, they may choose to remain in their apartment and sign a lease in their own name. This is especially helpful for any resident with a poor credit history.

Path to New Life, continuing the tradition of Michael's Place, fosters compassionate healing through a comprehensive approach that addresses the spiritual, physical, psychological and social well-being of the residents. **Path to New Life**, like all Society programs, is non sectarian and accepts men who are over twenty years of age regardless of race, color or creed.

## The Journey Continues. . .

Peter came to Michael's Place in 2010 with a history of alcohol addiction which resulted in the breakup of his marriage, loss of employment, estrangement from his family and incarceration. He went from being a young man with a promising construction career to a homeless alcoholic! In desperation, Peter decided it was time to make some serious changes in his life. He entered a rehabilitation center and then applied to Michael's Place.

After arriving at Michael's Place, he continued to work on his recovery from addiction. Peter was 48 years old and knew that if he wanted to rebuild his life, he needed to address an injury to his hip. Michael's Place gave him the support that enabled Peter to have arthroscopic surgery in an attempt to repair the damage. After a second surgery, the doctor informed him that he would never be able to stand for long periods without significant pain. This made it impossible to go back to any job involving heavy labor. Peter began taking courses at Community College in construction supervision and estimating. He transferred his strong work ethic to studying and spent many hours at the dining



room table with his books.

When our new permanent housing program ***Path to New Life (PNL)*** started in 2012, Peter was ready to continue on his path. His personal strengths and goals, coupled with his disabilities, made Peter the ideal candidate for **PNL**. He graduated from Michael's Place in December 2012 and became the first resident of **PNL**.

Moving into his own apartment gave Peter the opportunity to continue his college courses and recovery program. It also gave him the ability to spend more time helping his father who was experiencing lifestyle changes due to poor health.

Using his talent and passion for creative design, Peter continues at CCAC taking AutoCAD and other CAD design courses and will earn his Construction Supervision Degree this spring. Peter is considering the option of completing AutoCAD Certification. He continues to maintain a 3.5 QPA.

Continuing to lead an active and productive life, Peter keeps his connection with the staff and residents of Michael's Place. He is always the first to extend a hand of welcome to other men coming into the **PNL** Program and apartment building. He offers his time and talent to help new men get settled in their apartments as well as opportunities for building fellowship and community. Peter's always ready with a joke and a smile. He truly is traveling on the "*path to new life*"!

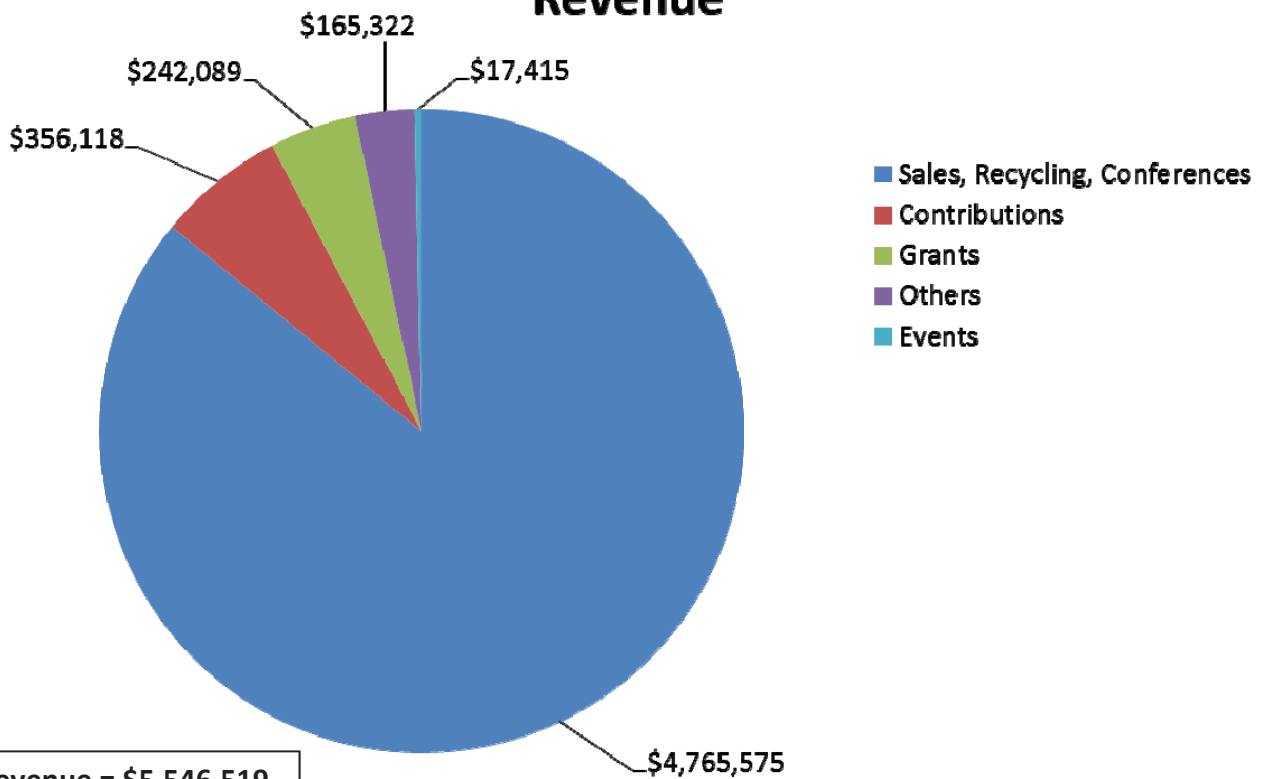
### During 2013, Michael's Place served. . .

- 19 men.
- The average age of the men was 34 years. Ages ranged from 22 years to 54 years.
- 9 men entered during the year: 1 entered directly from the jail; 4 from substance abuse treatment centers; 2 from emergency shelters; and 2 directly from the street.
- 5 men participated in vocational training or schooling.
- Of the 9 men who left during the year: 0 had income at entry; 6 were employed at exit; 1 was approved for Social Security Income.
- 8 of 9 men exiting, moved to permanent housing. 1 self-admitted to substance abuse treatment center.
- 1 man was the first participant in Saint Vincent de Paul's new housing program, Path to New Life.
- Michael's Place currently has 2 alumni on staff; 1 was promoted to Service Coordinator.

# Revenue & Expense Summary\*

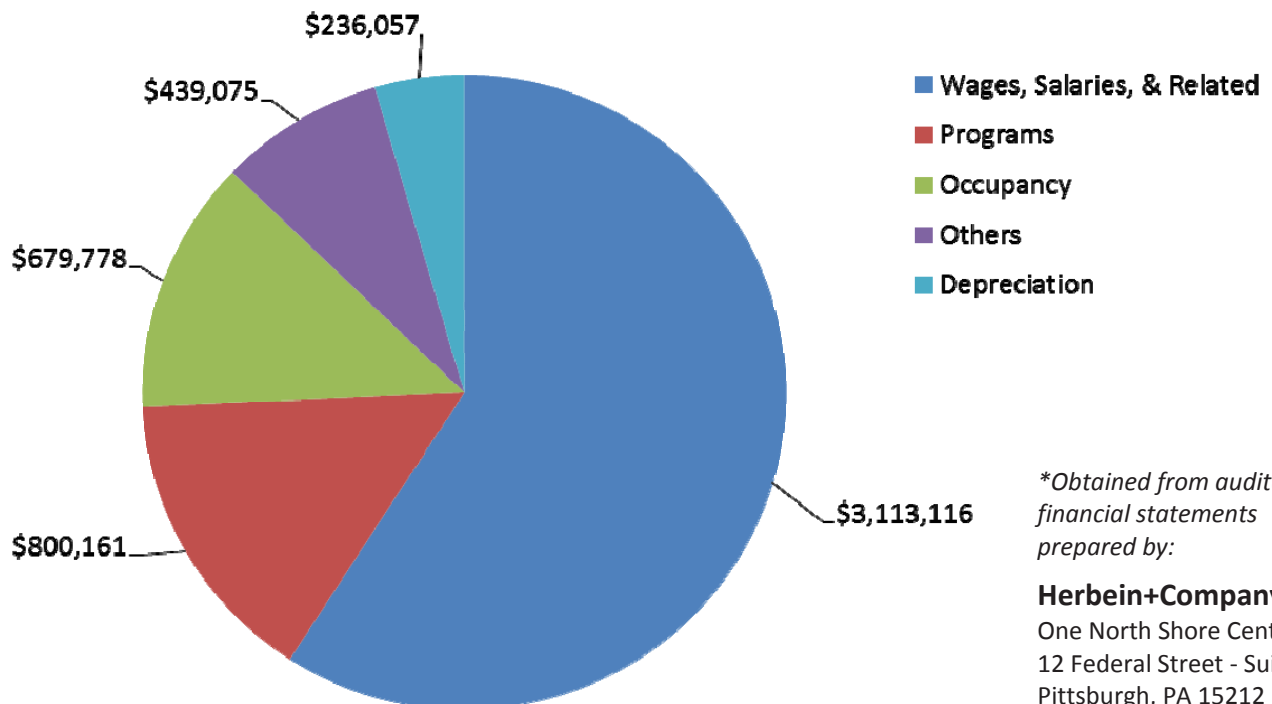
October 1, 2012 - September 30, 2013
