My first home visit was on a chilly Tuesday night in January 2001. I was a new Vincentian so I wasn't sure what to expect. I made a silent vow to keep quiet and try to be as inconspicuous as humanly possible. Butterflies were performing an aerial show in my gut. My heartbeat increased and my feet felt like I was wearing boots made out of concrete.



As my Vincentian brother took the lead heading up the short, uneven sidewalk attached to three wide porch steps, I - without any shame -- started to take a visual inventory of the contents outside of this yellow brick home.

The first thing that caught my scanning, critical eyes was the car resting on a car pad. It was a cream color Cadillac with a dark roof. I made a note of it on my mental inventory list.

As I stared at the car, a lady opened the front door. I was so distracted by why someone who could afford a contemporary Cadillac would call our St. Philip SVdP Conference for help that my usual keen observational skills failed to notice the physical signs of distress on her face.

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The Power of the Home Visit

From the Society's beginning, the central and most basic activity of Conferences has been the visitation of the needy in their homes. This is the clearest symbol of our Vincentian charism, which dictates the highest respect for the dignity of the poor. It symbolizes our Vincentian commitment to reach out to the needy, rather than require them to report to an outside service site. In the home, needy persons feel most free to confide their stories of struggle. In that family setting, Vincentians are asked to listen, offer humble advice, and render assistance. **The Manual, Section 2.1**

After our weekly meetings, some of our members pick up furniture, appliances, and clothing that have been donated by families in our community. The items are then stored in a building owned by the Knights of Columbus to await delivery.

Approximately 12 times a year, St. Philip conference members load a truck and deliver some of these items to Preston County Hope House

in Tunnelton, West Virginia - a program we have supported for over thirty years. In between trips to West Virginia, the conference provides furniture and appliances to local families in need.
