From the Society's beginning, the central and most basic activity of Conferences has been the visitation of the needy in their homes. This is the clearest symbol of our Vincentian charism, which dictates the highest respect for the dignity of the poor. It symbolizes our Vincentian commitment to reach out to the needy, rather than require them to report to an outside service site. In the home, needy persons feel most free to confide their stories of struggle. In that family setting, Vincentians are asked to listen, offer humble advice, and render assistance. Located below the Penn Hills store, the warehouse provides essential support for every aspect of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul Council of Pittsburgh's operations. The warehouse picks up the clothes donated in our 95 donation boxes throughout Allegheny County. They pick up furniture donations from donors and deliver furniture to voucher clients. And they recycle excess clothing donations which produces revenue vital to our many programs.

Questions & Answers



Question: How do I donate my vehicle? Does the vehicle have to be in working condition?

Answer: Your tax deductible car donation is imperative to our ability to provide utility assistance to those without power, clothing or furniture vouchers to those in need of basic necessities, and a dignified burial to those who have died alone -- and also direct assistance for those who are in need of a vehicle.

Making a car donation is pretty easy; call 800.322.8284 or donate online by clicking <u>here</u>.

The vehicle does not have to be in working condition. While we do have clients in need of cars from time to time, if your vehicle does not run, proceeds from its auction support our food pantry, Michael's Place, our utility assistance program, and many other forms of important direct assistance.

When you call to place your donation, they'll ask you a few questions. So here are some tips on what to have on hand before calling: the title for the vehicle, general information about the vehicle (i.e. Is it inspected? What is the make, model, and the Vehicle Identification Number?), and the current mileage. Once we know that information, we'll get the process started.
