

Dear friends,

"In our world people are all too ready to believe in bad news, but it can be hard to believe that all will be well in the face of current events. What is the good news that God is inviting you to believe in?" That is from Pray as You Go's meditation of Sunday, February 18th (you can probably tell I don't like footnotes). Lent started early this year, on February 14th. For some -including me- it provided a certain sense of awkwardness that Ash Wednesday would coincide with Valentine's day. That awkwardness didn't stay with me for long, though.

Lent is often associated with penance and for good reasons. There is, however, one overarching concept that Jesus sets on fire for us more so during Lent than at any other time. It is that of love. It is through Jesus' love for us that we are driven to pray, to fast, to care for the needy, to donate money, to live out gratitude for God's gifts. How appropriate then, that Ash Wednesday was also Valentine's day. And how do Vincentians live out their Lent? That is a personal question, with obviously differing answers depending on who you ask.

As a group, however, at one Conference, one Council, they do what they always do. They pray as they come together at the beginning of each meeting. They pray that they continue to grow stronger in the face of adversity, that they may enrich their relationship with each other and with Jesus Christ, that they may see Jesus in the faces of those they visit, that those they encounter may be driven to seek Jesus. God answers prayers according to His time and will. And sometimes we get to see clear evidence of how prayers are answered.

We occasionally get written, unsolicited testimonials from friends in need and Vincentians alike describing their journey of restored peace and hope. Recently we received a few lines from an unexpected type of stakeholder, a landlord. This individual thanked the Society for helping his tenant. The acts that arise from the hands and feet of our Vincentians are so far reaching that we lose sight of the full impact they have. The starting point for all this is Jesus inviting us to conversion through His undeniable, unconditional love for us. And yes, this happens during Lent.

May this love lead you to accept God's invitation to receive and share the good news with those around you. And may you enjoy reading February's Visitor!


As a musician and church Music Director, Terry had long contributed to the work and mission of the church in many ways. But apparently the group
